

Context of capacity building programme



- Strong link between land and poverty: legal access to land is a prerequisite for provision of shelter
- The failure to adopt land policies remains a primary case of inequity and poverty. Land administration is a critical element in the wider development agenda

Transparency in Land Administration



 Transparency is a critical component of a well functioning land administration

×

- Scarcity of clear and credible information on land and transactions
- Poor dissemination of public information land rights
- Real risk of corruption

Consequences to the poor




Takes the form of:

- Difficult access to land assets
- Unawareness of land policies
- Ignorances about land transactions and prices
- Misallocation of land rights
- Land grabbing

Activities 2007-2008

- Expert Group Meeting on "Transparency in Land Administration: A Capacity Building Agenda for Africa"; Nairobi, January 2007
- Pilot programme in Africa 2007-2008
 - Three-day curriculum
 - Four African regions: Eastern Africa, Southern Africa, Western Africa Francophone, Western Africa Anglophone
 - Four regional partners: UCLAS, PoN, ENDA and KNUST
 - Target group: upstream change agents

First pilot course: fall 2007 in Ghana
