# Awards recognition for ICES members

ICES members have been recognised in the survey awards run by equipment distributors SCCS. Chris Preston (pictured), chair of



the institution's Geospatial Engineering Practices Committee, has been named 'most influential geomatician' for 2014. Mr Preston is senior engineer and head of topographical survey at Network Rail, and also chaired the inaugural GEO Business conference and exhibition last spring.

Paul MacArthur, managing director of SCCS, commented: "At Network Rail, Chris has tirelessly been promoting the benefits of survey both pre and during construction, which has led to new specifications to be adopted later this year."

Joining Mr Preston, was ICES member Tony Shillaker of Clear Route, who won the award for non-technical product development for the IBB1 — an accessory for target systems to aid surveying underground in the dark.

Other winners included BFK's chief surveyor on Crossrail, Stewart Harrison, for his work developing point cloud technology to display 'live' layer thickness during sprayed concrete linings construction, and Wisen Innovations for its work on wireless strain gauges and bidirectional tiltmeters.

#### Approval for apprenticeships in civil engineering

The UK business secretary Vince Cable has announced plans for 22 new apprenticeships, including civil engineering. The Institution of Civil Engineers partnered with Balfour Beatty to develop the civil engineering site manager pathway that is among the new qualifications.

Director general Nick Baveystock said: "This will fill a much needed gap in provision, enabling young people to enter into a highly mobile and rewarding industry. ICE will continue to work with Balfour Beatty, other engineering companies and potential course providers, with the aim of setting up a network of training partners and employers."

# New regime at FIG

Chryssy Potsiou has formally taken on the role of president of the International Federation of Surveyors (FIG) for 2015-2018. Ms Potsiou, from Greece's Technical Chamber, had been gradually taking over the role over the last six months from CheeHai Teo.
