

Membership Application for a Member Association

General

Full membership of the International Federation of Surveyors (FIG) is open to a national association representing one or more of the disciplines of surveying (see the following FIG definition of a surveyor) and whose members

- possess relevant academic qualifications (which should normally be equivalent to at least UNESCO International Standard Classification of Education (ISCED) level 5 degrees) plus approved professional experience; and
- who provide professional services in accordance with ethical standards.

Associations which include technician grades of membership are also eligible for membership of the Federation.

A group of surveyors or surveying organisation, comprised of individuals who practise the profession of surveying, which does not fulfil the criteria for membership as a member association can be admitted to join the Federation as an affiliate member. An affiliate may be admitted to membership where the discipline or disciplines it represents are not already represented within the Federation by a member association from the same country. The admission of an affiliate should normally be a step towards the development of an association which can eventually become a member association.

Each category of membership provides opportunities for establishing contact with the international surveying community and thereby assisting with the development of indigenous academic and professional training programmes, including CPD facilities, and the development of technical and professional standards.

Only member associations are entitled to vote at FIG's annual administrative meetings. An affiliate and other members may nominate a representative to attend as an observer. All FIG members receive copies of FIG publications, monthly e-Newsletters and the Annual Review; and are entitled to nominate one delegate to each of FIG's ten technical commissions. Participation to the Commission work is one of the most important benefits of membership of FIG. However these benefits only come about if those nominated as delegates participate in the work of the commissions and publicise the results within their own countries; and FIG has therefore published guidelines for its members and for their national commission delegates.

As from 1 January 2019 the annual fee payable by a member association is 4.80 € per member of the association for a calendar year. Minimum fee is 25 members or 50 € per member association and maximum fee 5,500 members (26,400 €). Member associations from the poorest countries (countries listed by the World Bank as low-income economies or lower-middle-income economies) shall pay 2.40 € per member up to a maximum of 5,500 members.

An association wishing to apply for full membership should complete the relevant application form and return it to the Council. Applications are assessed first by the Council, which decides whether to recommend them for approval by the General Assembly.

In the case of an application received from an association in a country which already has one or more member associations, these associations shall be informed of the application and their comments sought.

FIG DEFINITION OF SURVEYOR

A surveyor is a professional person with the academic qualifications and technical expertise to practise the science of measurement; to assemble and assess land and geographic related information; to use that information for the purpose of planning and implementing the efficient administration of the land, the sea and structures thereon; and to instigate the advancement and development of such practices.

Practice of the surveyor's profession may involve one or more of the following activities which may occur either on, above or below the surface of the land or the sea and may be carried out in association with other professionals.

- 1. The determination of the size and shape of the earth and the measurement of all data needed to define the size, position, shape and contour of any part of the earth.
- 2. The positioning of objects in space and the positioning and monitoring of physical features, structures and engineering works on, above or below the surface of the earth.
- 3. The determination of the position of the boundaries of public or private land, including national and international boundaries, and the registration of those lands with the appropriate authorities.
- 4. The design, establishment and administration of land and geographic information systems and the collection, storage, analysis and management of data within those systems.
- The study of the natural and social environment, the measurement of land and marine resources and the use of the data in the planning of development in urban, rural and regional areas.
- 6. The planning, development and redevelopment of property, whether urban or rural and whether land or buildings.
- 7. The assessment of value and the management of property, whether urban or rural and whether land or buildings.
- 8. The planning, measurement and management of construction works, including the estimation of costs.
- 9. The production of plans, maps, files, charts and reports.

In the application of the foregoing activities surveyors take into account the relevant legal, economic, environmental and social aspects affecting each project.

FIG MEMBERS AND THEIR COMMISSION DELEGATES

The purpose of these guidelines is to help ensure that the full benefits of FIG membership are passed down to all the individual members of associations or other organisations that are members of the Federation.

To ensure that these individual members are kept fully informed of and input where necessary to the work of FIG and its commissions, FIG recommends that

- FIG members should support, or encourage others to support, the attendance of national commission delegates at annual FIG working weeks (including annual commission delegate meetings and technical symposia) and other symposia organised by the commissions
- FIG members and their national commission delegates should consider establishing networks within their countries to communicate information and obtain feedback
- national commission delegates should be actively involved in commission activities, including responding to questionnaires or correspondence and identifying topics and authors of papers for commission symposia and FIG congresses
- FIG members should seek and encourage funding support to enable national commission delegates to attend FIG activities, including commission meetings

National commission delegates should write at least one annual report for publication in a local newsletter or technical journal or for dissemination by some other means to individual members of their association or organisation.

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IAAO Code of Ethics and Standards of Professional Conduct

Preamble

Members and certificants (referred to herein collectively as "members") of the International Association of Assessing Officers ("IAAO"), as well as non-members of IAAO involved in IAAO activities, should conduct themselves in a professional manner that reflects favorably upon themselves, the organization, the appraisal profession, and the property tax system, and should avoid any action that could discredit themselves or these entities. They should exhibit appropriate professional conduct in their interactions with all individuals whom they encounter in connection with their professional roles, including colleagues, employees, clients, and owners of property subject to assessment.

This Code of Ethics and Standards of Professional Conduct (the "Code") establishes the minimum standards of conduct to which all IAAO members must adhere. We must do more, however, than simply obey the rules. Public trust in our performance is the foundation of our credibility. We must therefore embrace the highest ethical principles, and the pursuit of excellence, accountability, transparency, inclusivity, and responsiveness must be integral to our behavior. This is embodied in the IAAO Statement of Values, which serves as a foundation for the Code.

IAAO Core Values

The core values of the International Association of Assessing Officers include the following:

- We are committed to diversity, equity, and inclusion.
- We embrace transparency, integrity, honesty, and stewardship of resources.
- We respect the worth and dignity of all individuals.
- We are dedicated to excellence in assessment administration and the property tax system worldwide.
- We are accountable to the public good.
- We encourage the appropriate use of technology and tools for fair and equitable assessment administration.

These core values are reflected in the following Code of the International Association of Assessing Officers.

I. The Code

This Code sets out Canons of Ethics, to which all members should strive to adhere in their professional roles and in their activities as a member of IAAO. Each Canon is accompanied by enforceable Ethical Rules. Violation of an Ethical Rule, supplying misleading or false information to the Ethics Committee or refusing to cooperate with an Ethics Committee proceeding may subject a member to disciplinary action, sanction, or revocation of membership.

Exceptions

If compliance with or adherence to any Canon or Ethical Rule set forth in the Code would constitute a violation of the law of any jurisdiction, such Canon or Ethical Rule shall be void and of no force or effect in such jurisdiction.

In stating each individual Canon or Ethical Rule, no attempt has been made to enumerate all of the various circumstances and conditions that will excuse an IAAO member from strict observance; however, IAAO recognizes that illness, acts of God, and various other events beyond the control of an IAAO member may make it inequitable to insist upon a strict observance in a particular case. When an IAAO member, in the exercise of reasonable care, commits a violation due to illness, acts of God, or other circumstances beyond their control, it is expected that the Ethics Committee will act in a manner that will avoid an inequitable result.

Canon 1: Professional Duties

Members shall conduct their professional duties and any activities as a member of IAAO in a manner that reflects credit upon themselves, their profession and the organization.

Ethical Rules

- ER 1-1 Members shall not conduct their professional duties in a manner that could reasonably be expected to create the appearance of impropriety.
- ER 1-2 Members shall not accept an appraisal or assessment-related assignment which they are not qualified to perform.
- ER 1-3 Members shall follow local laws and regulations relating to the appraisal, assessment, and taxation of property within their jurisdictions.
- ER 1-4 Members must make available all public records in their custody for public review, unless access to such records is specifically limited or prohibited by law, or the information has been obtained on a confidential basis and the law permits such information to be treated confidentially.
- ER 1-5 Members must make reasonable efforts to inform the public about their rights and responsibilities under the law and the property tax system.
- ER 1-6 Members shall cooperate with public officials to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the property tax system, and of public administration in general.
- ER 1-7 Members shall not engage in misconduct of any kind that leads to a conviction, guilty plea, or no contest plea, for a crime directly related to the member's professional role or involving fraud, dishonesty, or false statements, or for which the underlying facts relating to the conviction constitute a violation of these Canons or Ethical Rules.

ER 1-8 Members shall not violate an applicable law in the performance of a member's professional role or in interactions with those a member encounters in connection with the member's professional role, including laws prohibiting harassment, discrimination, or retaliation in the workplace.

ER 1-9 Members shall not engage in harassment, discrimination, or retaliation in connection to IAAO activities.

Canon 2: Truthfulness

Members shall not make false or misleading statements (written or oral) in the course of performing their professional duties.

Ethical Rules

- ER 2-1 Members shall not provide inaccurate, untruthful, or misleading information to solicit assessment-related assignments or use misleading claims or promises of relief.
- ER 2-2 Members shall not claim or imply that they have specific qualifications unless they in fact have such qualifications.
- ER 2-3 Members shall not claim, imply, or hold themselves out as having an IAAO professional designation unless authorized by IAAO to do so.
- ER 2-4 Members shall provide appropriate attribution to the source(s) of any materials quoted or cited in writings or speeches.

Canon 3: Conflict of Interest

Members shall not engage in any activities in which they have, or may reasonably be considered by the public as having, a conflict of interest.

Ethical Rules

- ER 3-1 Members shall not accept an appraisal or assessment-related assignment that can reasonably be construed as being in conflict with their responsibility to their jurisdiction, employer, or client, or in which they have an unrevealed personal interest or bias.
- ER 3-2 Members shall not accept an assignment or responsibility in which there is a personal interest (whether individually or of a member's family or close personal connection) without full disclosure of that interest.
- ER 3-3 Members shall not accept an assignment or participate in an activity where the member is or could reasonably be perceived as being unable to conduct the assignment or activity in an unbiased, objective manner.

Canon 4: Support of IAAO

Members shall abide by and support the provisions of the IAAO governing documents, rules, and policies.

Ethical Rules

ER 4-1 Members shall not violate the IAAO governing documents, rules, or policies.

ER 4-2 Members shall not knowingly make false statements or submit misleading information when completing an IAAO application for membership or professional designation, and shall promptly submit any significant information in the possession of such member when requested to do so as part of an IAAO application.

ER 4-3 Members shall cooperate fully with the IAAO Board of Directors, Ethics Committee and the staff of IAAO in all matters related to the enforcement of this Code, as set forth in the IAAO governing documents and specific rules and procedures for enforcement, as may be adopted and amended by the Board of Directors from time to time, including by timely providing complete and accurate information as requested.

ER 4-4 Members shall submit promptly any significant information in the possession of a member concerning the status of litigation related to an ethics matter when requested to do so by the chair of the Ethics Committee; and shall not knowingly submit misleading information to the chair of the Ethics Committee concerning the status of litigation.

ER 4-5 Members shall not knowingly provide any false information to the IAAO, or cheat or assist another in cheating in connection with any course or examination, including any IAAO professional designation test.

Canon 5: Compliance with Appropriate Professional Practice Standards

Members shall comply with the applicable standards of practice in their jurisdiction.

Ethical Rules

ER 5-1 Members in the United States shall observe the requirements of the *Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice* and members residing outside the United States shall follow appraisal standards that govern appraisers within their jurisdiction.

II. ENFORCEMENT

Anyone who believes that an IAAO member has violated the IAAO Code of Ethics may submit a written complaint to IAAO.

IAAO may also initiate a review of a member's actions or behavior without the filing of a formal complaint.

Filing a Complaint

Formal complaints or allegations shall be signed by the complainant and officially filed at IAAO Headquarters within one year of the alleged violation. The complaint or allegation shall include the following information:

- The name of the person(s) submitting the complaint and the name and any other identifying detail (e.g., title, jurisdiction) of the person(s) ["respondent(s)"] alleged to have committed the violation.
- A description of the event, including the date and circumstances of the alleged violation.
- A statement explaining any relevant prior interactions or professional or personal relationship that the person filing has with the person(s) named in the complaint.
- Names and contact information of witnesses, if applicable.

To the extent practical, the complainant should provide details, specific facts, and documentation of the allegations. Additionally, the complainant(s) should provide their contact information, including a phone number and email address.

The complaint shall also include the following statement:

I authorize IAAO to contact me regarding this complaint, if deemed necessary. I authorize IAAO to release this complaint and all other supporting material I have provided, or may provide in the future, to the subject of the complaint, members of IAAO's Ethics Committee, the IAAO Board of Directors, IAAO's attorney(s), and others as deemed appropriate by IAAO or as required by law.

The complainant may include verifiable supporting documentation, including signed witness statements. Complaints shall be submitted to IAAO's Headquarters using the *Code of Ethics Complaint Form*.

IAAO has the sole discretion to determine which complaints should be pursued, how they should be pursued, and what action, if any, should be taken. IAAO may also, in its sole discretion, defer review of, or action on, a complaint unless and until the allegations have been investigated by a third-party entity with jurisdiction over the actions and greater investigative authority than IAAO, such as the member's employer or a court.

Process of Evaluating Violations

Upon receiving a complaint, the IAAO Executive Director will conduct a preliminary review to determine whether the complaint, on its face, alleges a violation of the IAAO Code of Ethics. In conducting this preliminary review of a complaint, the IAAO Executive Director may communicate with complainant to clarify or request more information, and/or may supplement the complaint with information that it develops through its own investigation but has no obligation to do so.

If, based on the preliminary review of the complaint, the allegation does not indicate a violation of IAAO's Code of Ethics (e.g., because it relates to matters outside the scope of this Code of Ethics or the conduct does not rise to the level of a violation), the IAAO Executive Director may administratively close the complaint without further action. The complainant and respondent will be notified of this closure. The complainant has the right to appeal the Executive Director's decision, in writing, to IAAO Headquarters within 30 calendar days. In that event, IAAO's Ethics Committee will conduct an independent review and determine whether to uphold the dismissal of the complaint or return the matter to the Executive Director for initiation of a full disciplinary proceeding. The complainant and respondent will be notified of the Ethics Committee's decision.

If the IAAO Executive Director determines the allegation presents evidence of a violation of the Code of Ethics, the IAAO Executive Director shall convene the Ethics Committee and share the complaint with them for further review. The IAAO Executive Director shall also forward the complaint to the respondent unless the Ethics Committee determines that consideration of the complaint should be deferred.

The respondent shall have 30 calendar days from the date of notice of a complaint to respond in writing to the allegations. The respondent should provide a full statement of relevant facts and verifiable supporting documentation, which may include signed witness statements. If the respondent does not respond to the notice or dispute the allegations within 30 calendar days, the allegations against the respondent in the complaint may be deemed to be fact. While the Ethics Committee or the IAAO Executive Director may seek additional information, it is not the duty of the Ethics Committee or any other representative of IAAO to find evidence outside the case presented by the complainant. All submissions from the complainant or respondent and any other information presented to the Ethics Committee for consideration shall be provided to the respondent before the Ethics Committee hearing or determination of the case.

The respondent may also request a virtual hearing on the matter before the Ethics Committee. The respondent may provide a brief statement and respond to questions from the Ethics Committee. The hearing will not include witnesses. If the respondent is represented by an attorney, the attorney may share the respondent's time for presenting a statement but may not appear in lieu of the respondent. If the complaint alleges misconduct towards the complainant, the complainant may also elect to participate in the hearing, make a brief statement, and respond to questions from the Ethics Committee, but the complainant is not obligated to appear for the hearing. If the complainant participates, the respondent may listen to the complainant's portion of the hearing and may respond during the hearing. Documents not submitted to the Ethics Committee in advance of the hearing will not be considered by the Ethics Committee.

If the respondent does not request a hearing, the Ethics Committee will render a decision based on the written record.

The Ethics Committee will meet in executive session to decide on the complaint. The Ethics Committee shall decide, based solely on the record before it, whether the respondent has committed a violation of the Code of Ethics and any sanctions to be imposed.

Notice of the disposition of the proceeding will be given to the complainant and respondent within 30 calendar days. Notice of any disciplinary sanction will be sent to the respondent within 30 calendar days of its issuing. If a disciplinary sanction is imposed, the notice will include an explanation of the basis for the decision and a statement of any appeal rights.

Sanctions

Sanctions for violation of this Code of Ethics may include one or more of the following, in IAAO's discretion:

- Assignment of remedial education
- Private reprimand and warning
- Public letter of censure
- Removal from IAAO volunteer position(s)
- Restrictions on privileges and rights as a member, including holding leadership or committee roles
- Suspension or expulsion from participating in IAAO events or activities
- Suspension or revocation of IAAO instructor credentials
- Denial or non-renewal of professional designation(s)
- Suspension or revocation of professional designation(s)
- Suspension or expulsion from membership or
- Other corrective or disciplinary action, as determined in IAAO's discretion.

Appeals

All respondents have the right to appeal an adverse decision resulting in a sanction (other than assignment of remedial education or a private reprimand and warning) regarding an alleged violation of the IAAO Code of Ethics. Such appeals shall be submitted in writing to IAAO Headquarters within 30 calendar days of the date of the determination notice and shall state with specificity the grounds for appeal. If no request for appeal is made within 30 calendar days, the decision, as issued, will become final.

The IAAO Executive Committee shall review an appeal within 60 calendar days of receipt of the appeal. Appeals shall include a signed statement from the subject of the disciplinary action containing their full statement of the facts relevant to the alleged violation and the specific basis for appeal. New information will not be considered for appeal unless it was unavailable at the time of the Ethics Committee's determination. If such new information is provided, the appeal will be remanded to the Ethics Committee for a determination as to whether it warrants modification of the Ethics Committee's determination or sanction.

The IAAO Executive Committee will conduct an initial review of the appeal to determine whether the specific grounds for appeal raise a question of: (I) a procedural error, or (II) an arbitrary and capricious decision by the Ethics Committee. Appeals that do not meet that threshold standard shall be denied. If an appeal meets that threshold standard, the President shall forward the appeal to the IAAO Board of Directors for review. The Board of Directors shall review the record in the case, including the request for appeal. The Board's review shall be limited to a determination of whether: (I) a procedural error contributed to the Ethics Committee's decision, or (II) the Ethics Committee's decision was arbitrary and capricious. The Board of Directors may affirm, modify, or reverse the adverse decision made by the Ethics Committee. The decision on appeal is final and binding. Notification of the decision on appeal and an explanation of the basis for the decision will be sent to the appellant within 14 calendar days of its issuing.

Reinstatement

If an individual has been expelled from membership or had their professional designation revoked, eligibility for reinstatement may be reconsidered on the following basis:

- In the event of a felony conviction related to the individual's professional role, no earlier than three years from the conviction or completion of sentence (if any), whichever is later.
- In any other event, no earlier than two years from the final decision of expulsion or revocation.

In addition to other facts required by IAAO, an individual seeking reinstatement of eligibility for membership or professional designation shall fully set forth the circumstances of the expulsion

or revocation decision, as well as all relevant facts and circumstances since the decision that are relevant to the application for reinstatement. When expulsion or revocation was because of felony conviction, the individual bears the burden of demonstrating that the individual has been rehabilitated.

Application for reinstatement, relevant documentation required of all applicants for membership or professional designation, and all relevant evidence supporting the reinstatement request shall be submitted in writing to IAAO Headquarters. The IAAO Ethics Committee shall determine whether the reinstatement shall be granted. Unless and until IAAO makes a decision to reestablish eligibility for reinstatement, the individual will remain ineligible for reinstatement. The applicant will be notified of the decision within 60 calendar days of receipt by IAAO of all the required documentation from the applicant. The decision of the IAAO Ethics Committee may be appealed to the IAAO Board of Directors.

Deliberations

An attorney representing IAAO may be present and offer advice for any deliberations contemplated under these procedures.

Majority vote applies, where a quorum is present, for all actions taken by the Ethics Committee or the Board of Directors.

No individual who is a member of the Ethics Committee or the Board of Directors, or the Executive Director, will participate in deliberations or decisions involving the Code of Ethics where the individual has a significant past or current family, business, or personal/social relationship with the complainant or respondent based on the information disclosed by either or otherwise has a conflict of interest.

Publication and Reporting

IAAO may, as deemed appropriate, report sanctions other than assignment of remedial education or a private reprimand and warning, and the underlying facts of the violation, to interested parties, including without limitation to persons seeking information about an individual's membership or professional designation status, as solely determined by IAAO. IAAO also may publish the information on IAAO's website. If the sanction resulted from a violation reported to IAAO in a disciplinary complaint, IAAO will notify the complainant that it has completed its disciplinary proceeding and, if any public sanction has been imposed, of the disciplinary action taken.

Notifications to the complainant or third parties will not occur until either the time for an appeal has expired or a decision on an appeal is made.

Responsibility for Notifying IAAO of Current Contact Information

IAAO members are solely responsible for ensuring that their IAAO account includes their current mailing and email addresses. If an individual does not receive notice(s) from IAAO related to disciplinary proceedings, actions, or appeals due to the individual's failure to notify IAAO in a timely manner of a change of address, that lack of notification shall not be considered as the basis for an appeal or reconsideration of any decision in the matter.

Revisions to the Code of Ethics were adopted by the IAAO Board of Directors on November 5, 2021; the Enforcement Section was adopted by the IAAO Board of Directors on May 26, 2022.

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF ASSESSING OFFICERS

BYLAWS

ARTICLE 1. NAME AND ORGANIZATION

- <u>Section 1.1.</u> Name. The name of this association is the International Association of Assessing Officers ("IAAO" or the "Association").
- <u>Section 1.2.</u> <u>Organization</u>. The Association is organized under the General Not For Profit Corporation Act of 1986 of the State of Illinois (the "Illinois Act").

ARTICLE 2. MISSION

- <u>Section 2.1.</u> <u>Mission</u>. International Association of Assessing Officers (IAAO) is a global community of diverse mass appraisal professionals advancing fair and equitable property appraisal, assessment administration, and property tax policy through professional development, research, standards, and technical assistance. To that end, IAAO shall:
- A. Support and promote professional development;
- B. Prepare and deliver educational services;
- **C.** Provide technical assistance and consulting services;
- D. Strengthen membership and encourage growth;
- **E.** Provide information and counseling;
- F. Provide and encourage research; and
- **G.** Promote public understanding.

ARTICLE 3. MEMBERSHIP

<u>Section 3.1.</u> <u>Membership Classes</u>. IAAO shall have four classes of membership, as follows:

A. Regular Members

- 1. Voting Rights. Regular members shall have voting rights and shall be entitled to one vote on each matter submitted to a vote of said members.
 - 2. *Qualifications*. Regular membership shall be open to any individual who:
 - a. is an officer, official, or employee of a governmental authority or jurisdiction who has any or all of his or her duties related to property valuation, property tax

administration, or property tax policy;

- **b.** provides professional services to governmental officers, officials, or offices of a governmental authority or jurisdiction directly in support of the property valuation, property tax administration, or property tax policy functions (but not including such ancillary functions as providing hardware, software, other equipment, or the sale of goods or services to government agencies);
- **c.** is retired from full-time employment, but who had been a regular member for at least ten years in the aggregate;
 - d. is a past president of IAAO.

B. Associate Members

- 1. Voting Rights. Associate members shall have voting rights solely with respect to the election of the associate director as set forth in these Bylaws. Each associate member shall be entitled to one vote.
 - 2. Qualifications. Associate membership shall be open to any individual who:
 - **a.** is an officer, official, or employee of a governmental authority or jurisdiction who does not have any of his or her duties related to property valuation, property tax administration, or property tax policy;
 - **b.** is an officer, administrator, employee, or enrolled student of an educational institution;
 - **c.** is involved in or interested in property valuation, property tax administration, or property tax policy;
 - **d.** is a member of any organization, group, or association, whether local, regional, national, or international, interested in property valuation, property tax administration, or property tax policy;
 - **e.** is retired from full-time employment and who has been an associate member for at least ten years in the aggregate.

C. Affiliate Members

- 1. *Voting Rights*. Affiliate members shall not have voting rights.
- 2. *Qualifications*. Affiliate membership shall be open to any organization or association interested in property valuation, property tax administration, or property tax policy, in accordance with requirements and procedures as determined by the board of directors.

D. Honorary Members

1. *Voting Rights.* Honorary Members shall not have voting rights.

2. Qualifications. Honorary membership shall be open to individuals who, in the opinion of the Board of Directors, have made a distinct contribution to the advancement of property valuation, property tax administration, or property tax policy, in accordance with such requirements and procedures determined by the Board of Directors. Nominations may also be made by members. The Board of Directors may not grant such membership to more than two individuals during any single fiscal year.

Section 3.2. Professional Designations.

A. Generally. The Board of Directors shall establish and maintain procedural rules which shall govern all aspects of IAAO's professional designation program. These procedural rules shall include but not be limited to the requirements for candidacy, the requirements for qualification for each designation, and the requirements for a program of periodic recertification. The Board of Directors will also establish a schedule of fees for participation in IAAO's professional designation program.

Section 3.3. Professional Conduct.

- A. All members shall subscribe to the mission and commitments of the Association. All members and certificants (designees) shall subscribe to the Association's Code of Ethics and Standards of Professional Conduct.
- **B.** The Board of Directors shall adopt procedural rules for the investigation of any alleged violation of the Code of Ethics and Standards of Professional Conduct and the discipline for any such violation. The rules shall set forth a process for disciplinary procedures and actions, and if applicable, for a hearing before an Ethics Committee established by the Board.

ARTICLE 4. OFFICERS

<u>Section 4.1.</u> Officers. The officers of IAAO shall be President, President-Elect (Treasurer), Vice President, Immediate Past President, and Executive Director (Secretary).

- A. **President** The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors, the Executive Committee and the members, and shall annually report to the membership on the status of IAAO. The President shall make all committee appointments that have become vacant, or other appointments as the Board of Directors shall determine and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Board of Directors. The President shall coordinate and approve all travel by the elected officers of the Association and shall ensure that the President-Elect receives maximum exposure to local organizations to provide for a smooth transition.
- B. President-Elect The President-Elect shall exercise all the powers and duties of the President during the President's absence or inability to act and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Board of Directors. The President-Elect shall represent IAAO at chapter, affiliate, and other professional organization meetings as directed by the President. The President-Elect shall serve as the Chair of the Finance Committee and Treasurer. The Treasurer shall annually propose a budget and upon its approval by the Board of Directors, shall be responsible for any moneys of the Association, keeping of the accounting records, and the preparing of financial statements in such form and in accordance with such procedure as may be required by the Board of Directors.;

- C. Vice President The Vice President shall exercise all the powers and duties of the President during the absence or inability to act of the President and the President-Elect and shall perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Board of Directors. At the direction of the President, the Vice President shall represent IAAO at meetings at which such representation may be appropriate. The Vice President shall serve as a member of the Finance Committee.
- D. Immediate Past President The Immediate Past President shall provide counsel and advice to the officers and Board of Directors members in an effort to facilitate the continuity of actions and programs of the Association. The Immediate Past-President shall exercise all the powers and duties of the President during the absence or inability to act of the President, President-Elect, and the Vice President. At the direction of the President, the Immediate Past President shall represent IAAO at meetings at which such representation may be appropriate.
- E. Executive Director The Board of Directors shall select an Executive Director, who is a non-voting officer, to serve at the pleasure of the Board of Directors, performing such duties and receiving such compensation as determined by the Board of Directors. The Executive Director shall (1) supervise the business and affairs of the Association, (2) carry out the orders, resolutions and assignments of the officers and the Board of Directors, (3) manage the day-to-day operations of the Association, (4) serve as the Secretary who shall give notice and keep minutes of all meetings, have custody of the records of the Association and the Association seal, and attest all necessary instruments, and (5) perform such other duties as may be from time to time assigned by the Board of Directors. The Executive Director may execute all bonds, deeds, mortgages, conveyances, contracts and other instruments, in the name of and on behalf of the Association, except as otherwise required by law or these Bylaws, and except in cases when the Board of Directors expressly delegates such authority to some other officer or agent of the Association. The Executive Director may appoint and discharge any employees or subordinates, prescribe their duties, and fix their compensation within the limits provided in the approved budget.

<u>Section 4.2.</u> <u>Term of Office</u>. All officers (other than the Executive Director) shall serve for a term of one year or until a successor is elected and assumes office. The Executive Director shall serve at the pleasure of the Board of Directors. At the expiration of their terms, the President-Elect shall automatically succeed to the office of President and the President shall automatically succeed to the office of Immediate Past President. All officers and directors shall assume office at 12:01 am on January 1 each year.

ARTICLE 5. MEMBERSHIP MEETINGS

<u>Section 5.1.</u> <u>Place</u>. All meetings of the members of the Association shall be held at such place within or without the State of Illinois as determined from time to time by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors may, in its sole discretion, determine that the meeting shall not be held at any place, but may instead be held solely by means of remote communication, as authorized in these bylaws.

<u>Section 5.2.</u> <u>Annual Meeting</u>. The annual meeting of the members of the Association shall be held during the annual conference of the Association, for the purpose of transacting such business as may properly be brought before the meeting.

<u>Section 5.3.</u> <u>Special Meetings</u>. Special meetings of the members, for any purpose or purposes, unless otherwise prescribed by statute or by the Articles of Incorporation, may be called by the President or the Board of Directors. Special meetings may not be called by the members.

<u>Section 5.4.</u> Quorum. Five percent (5%) of all members entitled to vote at any meeting shall constitute a quorum at a meeting of the members; provided, however, in the election of officers and/or Regular At-Large Directors, five percent (5%) of all Regular Members shall constitute a quorum for such election and in the election of the Associate At-Large Director, five percent (5%) of all Associate Members shall constitute a quorum. Except as specifically set forth in these Bylaws or as required by the Illinois Act, the act of a majority of the Regular Members (or, in the case of the election of the Association At-Large Director, Associate Members) at any meeting at which there is a quorum shall be the act of the members.

<u>Section 5.5.</u> <u>Notice of Meetings, Annual or Special.</u>

- A. Written notice of each meeting of the members stating the place, if any, the date and hour of such meeting, and the means of remote communications, if any, by which members may be deemed to be present in person and vote at such meetings, and, in the case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes of such meeting, shall be given either personally or by mail to each member of record entitled to vote at such meeting, not less than five (5) nor more than sixty (60) days before the date of the meeting (except in the case of a removal of one or more directors, a merger, consolidation, dissolution or sale, lease or exchange of assets, the notice shall be given not less than twenty (20) nor more than sixty (60) days before the date of the meeting). If mailed, notice is given when deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid, directed to the member at his or her address as it appears on the records of the Association.
- B. Written notice shall include notice by electronic transmission. Notice given by a form of electronic transmission shall be deemed given: (a) if by facsimile telecommunication, when directed to a number at which the member has consented to receive notice; (b) if by electronic mail, when directed to an electronic mail address at which the member has consented to receive notice; (c) if by a posting on an electronic network together with separate notice to the member of such specific posting, upon the later of (i) such posting and (ii) the giving of such separate notice; and (d) if by any other form of electronic transmission, when directed to the member.
- C. When a meeting is adjourned to another time or place, notice need not be given of the adjourned meeting if the time and place, if any, thereof, and the means of remote communications, if any, by which members may be deemed to be present in person and vote at such adjourned meeting are announced at the meeting at which the adjournment is taken. If the adjournment is for more than thirty (30) days, or if after the adjournment a new record date is fixed for the adjourned meeting, a notice of the adjourned meeting shall be given to each member of record entitled to vote at the meeting.
 - <u>Section 5.6.</u> Waiver of Notice. Whenever a member shall be entitled to notice under any provision of these Bylaws, the Articles of Incorporation, or the Illinois Act, a written waiver thereof, signed by the member entitled to notice, or a waiver by electronic transmission by the member, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to notice. Attendance of a member at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except when a member attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting, at

the beginning of the meeting, to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened.

Section 5.7. Mail Ballot.

- A. Any action to be taken at any annual or special meeting of the members, may be taken by written ballot without a meeting by mail, electronic mail, or any other electronic transmission pursuant to which the members entitled to vote thereon are given the opportunity to vote for or against the proposed action, and the action receives approval by a majority of the members casting votes, or such larger number as may be required by the Articles of Incorporation, these Bylaws or the Illinois Act, provided that the number of members casting votes would constitute a quorum if such action had been taken at a meeting. Voting must remain open for not less than five (5) days from the date the ballot is delivered; provided, however, in the case of a removal of one or more directors, a merger, consolidation, dissolution or sale, lease or exchange of assets, the voting must remain open for not less than twenty (20) days from the date the ballot is delivered.
- **B.** Such informal action by members shall become effective only if, at least five (5) days prior to the effective date of such informal action, a notice in writing of the proposed action is delivered to all of the members entitled to vote with respect to the subject matter thereof.
 - <u>Section 5.8.</u> <u>Proxies</u>. Members shall not be permitted to vote by proxy.
 - <u>Section 5.9.</u> <u>Meeting by Voice Communication Technologies</u>. Subject to any guidelines and procedures adopted by the Board of Directors, members not physically present at a meeting of members may participate in a meeting of the members by means of conference telephone or other communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other, and participation in a meeting by use of such equipment shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.
 - <u>Section 5.10.</u> <u>Definition of "Electronic Transmission"</u>. As used throughout these Bylaws, the phrase "electronic transmission" means any form of communication not directly involving the physical transmission of paper, that creates a record that may be retained, retrieved, and reviewed by a recipient thereof, and that may be directly reproduced in paper form by such a recipient through an automated process.

ARTICLE 6. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

- <u>Section 6.1.</u> <u>Board of Directors.</u> The Association shall be governed by a Board of Directors who shall manage its business and affairs in accordance with its fiduciary responsibilities.
- <u>Section 6.2.</u> <u>Composition</u>. The Board of Directors shall be composed of the President, President-Elect, Vice President, Immediate Past President, nine Regular Members (the "Regular At-Large Directors"), and one Associate Member (the "Associate At-Large Director").

Section 6.3. Term of Office.

- A. The Regular At-Large Directors shall be divided into three classes, with each class consisting of three directors and serving for a term of three years, with the term of office of one class expiring each year. Each year, candidates for Regular At-Large Director shall be placed in positions numbered 1, 2, and 3 by the nominating committee, with said positions representing three general geographic areas. The ballot shall contain a blank space for each position for write-in votes.
 - B. The Associate At-Large Director shall serve for a three-year term.
- **C.** No two people from the same state or province may concurrently hold Regular At-Large Director positions; provided, however, should a Regular At-Large Director relocate during his or her term, he or she shall be entitled to complete the term of office, provided all other requirements of the position are met.
- D. Whenever any officer or director separates from the employment that made the individual eligible for membership, the individual must re-certify that he or she is eligible for the appropriate membership category within 120 days of such separation or the individual's membership shall be deemed terminated and the position held by such individual will be deemed vacant.
- E. Individuals shall not be eligible to serve as a Regular At-Large Director or an Associate At-Large Director unless there have been at least three years between any prior service on the Board of Directors except in cases where the individual is appointed to fill a vacancy.

Section 6.4. Board Meetings.

- A. Meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at such place within or without the State of Illinois as may be designated by the Board of Directors.
- **B.** The annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held in January each year. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be held at any time upon call of the President or upon the request of a majority of the Board of Directors, and upon such call, the Executive Director shall provide notice and, within five business days, verify to the person(s) calling the meeting that notice was sent.
- C. Regular meetings of the Board of Directors may be held without notice. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be held upon not less than two (2) days' written notice of the time, place, and purpose of the meeting addressed to each director and delivered by electronic transmission or by United States mail, postage prepaid. Such notice shall be deemed to be given when electronically transmitted or deposited in the United States mail, postage prepaid.
- D. Whenever a director shall be entitled to notice under any provision of these Bylaws, a written waiver thereof, signed by the person entitled to notice, or a waiver by electronic transmission by the person entitled to notice, whether before or after the time stated therein, shall be deemed equivalent to notice. Attendance of a director at any meeting shall constitute a waiver of notice of such meeting, except when a director attends a meeting for the express purpose of objecting, at the beginning of the meeting, to the transaction of any business because the meeting is not lawfully called or convened. Neither the business to be transacted at nor the purpose of any regular or special meeting of the directors or members of a committee of directors need be specified in any waiver of notice.
- **E.** At all meetings of the Board of Directors, seventy five percent of the total number of directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

- **F.** Except as specifically set forth in these Bylaws, the act of a majority of the directors present at any meeting at which there is a quorum shall be the act of the Board of Directors.
- G. Unless otherwise restricted by the Articles of Incorporation, any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of the Board of Directors or of any committee thereof may be taken without a meeting, if all members of the Board of Directors or committee, as the case may be, consent thereto in writing, or by electronic transmission, and the writing or writings or electronic transmission or transmissions are filed with the minutes of proceedings of the Board of Directors or committee. Such filing shall be in paper form if the minutes are maintained in paper form and shall be in electronic form if the minutes are maintained in electronic form.
- H. Unless otherwise restricted by the Articles of Incorporation, members of the Board of Directors or of any committee thereof, may participate in a meeting of the Board of Directors or committee by means of conference telephone or other communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other, and participation in a meeting by use of such equipment shall constitute presence in person at such meeting.

Section 6.5. Executive Committee.

- A. There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the President (who shall serve as the Chair), President-Elect, Vice President, and Immediate Past President, which shall, subject to the limitations set forth in these Bylaws, act on behalf of the Board of Directors between meetings of the Board of Directors.
- B. All minutes of Executive Committee meetings shall be reported to all members of the Board of Directors within 48 hours of such meeting. All actions taken by the Executive Committee shall cease and be null and void unless they are ratified by a majority of the Board of Directors within said five business days.

Section 6.6. Vacancies.

- A. A vacancy in the office of President shall be filled by the President-Elect for the remainder of that term, who shall then continue to serve a full term as President had the vacancy not occurred.
- **B.** A vacancy in the office of President-Elect shall be filled by the Vice President for the remainder of the term.
- **C.** In the event of concurrent vacancies in two of the three offices of President, President-Elect, and Vice President, the remaining officer shall hold the office of President for the remainder of the term, and the Board of Directors shall appoint eligible regular members in good standing to fill the vacancies in the offices of President-Elect and Vice President. No person appointed to fill any vacancy shall succeed to the office of President without being elected to that position.
- **D.** In the event of concurrent vacancies in all three offices of President, President-Elect, and Vice President, the Board of Directors shall appoint eligible regular members in good standing to fill said vacancies. The Board of Directors may also hold a special election for the office of President.
- E. In the event of a vacancy in the office of Immediate Past President, the President shall appoint another Past President who is in good standing to fill the unexpired term, subject to confirmation by the Board of Directors.

- F. In the event of a vacancy of the Associate At-Large Director, the President shall appoint an eligible Associate Member in good standing to fill said vacancy, subject to confirmation by the Board of Directors.
- **G.** In the event of a vacancy of any Regular At-Large Director, the Board of Directors shall fill the vacancy until the next election cycle. Vacancies with less than six months remaining may remain vacant at the option of the Board of Directors.

<u>Section 6.7.</u> Removal of Director or Officer. One or more directors or officers may be removed, with or without cause. Upon the request of members constituting at least ten percent (10%) of the members in good standing eligible to vote for such director(s) or officer(s), as applicable, the Board of Directors shall establish a vote by ballot by mail, email, or any other electronic means pursuant to which the members entitled to vote thereon are given the opportunity to vote for or against the removal of the director(s) or officer(s). The director(s) or officers(s) shall be removed from their position by the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the votes cast provided that the number of members casting votes would constitute a quorum if such action had been taken at a meeting.

ARTICLE 7. ELECTIONS

Section 7.1. Generally.

- A. The officers (other than the Executive Director) and the Regular At-Large Directors shall be elected by plurality vote of the Regular Members.
 - B. The Associate At-Large Director shall be elected by plurality vote of the Associate Members.

Section 7.2. Procedural Rules.

- A. The Board of Directors shall establish and maintain procedures, regulations, and rules of order as deemed necessary to carry out the election process in accordance with these Bylaws, including rules to ensure a timely secret ballot and impartial counting and tabulation of the eligible votes. Such rules shall also provide rules and procedures for petitions. The President shall certify the election results and announce the vote count at the first Board of Directors meeting following the election.
- **B.** The Executive Director may be contacted concerning campaign, nomination, and election procedures.

Section 7.3. Nominating Committee.

- A. The Board of Directors shall annually appoint a Nominating Committee composed of four Regular Members, one of which shall be appointed as chair, and one Associate Member.
- **B.** Members of the Nominating Committee shall not be eligible for nomination to Board of Directors or Executive Officer positions.

Section 7.4. Nominations.

- A. Nominations may be made by the Nominating Committee or by petition. Any eligible member shall have the right of petition to have his or her name placed on the ballot for any one elected position.
- B. Completed petitions must be submitted to the Executive Director within five days following the end of the annual conference, along with a completed candidate's questionnaire, profile, and photograph. Petitions for officer positions or Regular At-Large Director positions must be signed by no fewer than five percent (5%) of the total number of Regular Members, and petitions for Associate At-Large Director shall be signed by no fewer than five percent (5%) of the Associate Members. All members whose names appear on petitions must be members of IAAO as of January 1st of that year; and no state, or province, shall represent or account for more than twenty-five percent of the required total. The Executive Director shall certify the validity of any petition.
- **C.** No individual shall be eligible to serve as an officer unless he or she has served at least three full years as a Regular At-Large Director and at least one year has passed since the end of his or her most recent term as a Regular At-Large Director.

Section 7.5. Campaigning.

- A. Candidates shall not make campaign expenditures or receive or otherwise benefit from contributions that would give the appearance of impropriety. Candidates shall be defined as persons who have:
 - 1. Been nominated by the Nominating Committee for any position;
 - 2. Publicly declared that they are seeking an IAAO elective position for any election year;
 - **3.** Solicited contributions intended to support a campaign for an IAAO elective position, or endorsements for such a position, on their own behalf; or
 - 4. Made any campaign expenditures on their own behalf.
- B. Candidates for all offices and regular member Board of Directors positions shall only accept direct cash contributions or personal service contributions from regular members, IAAO chapters, or IAAO affiliates. Associate members are prohibited from making cash or personal service contributions to candidates for all offices and regular member positions on the Board of Directors.
- **C.** Candidates for the associate member Board of Directors position shall accept direct cash contributions or personal service contributions only from associate members.
- **D.** Each candidate shall file a campaign report on a form approved by the Board of Directors. The report shall be filed by all candidates by December 7th following the election. This report shall list all campaign contributions received and campaign expenditures made by the candidate or on the candidate's behalf of which the candidate is aware.
- E. All campaign reports shall be reviewed by the Nominating Committee. If the Nominating Committee finds irregularities, the chair shall present such irregularities to the Ethics Committee. If the Ethics Committee confirms such irregularities, the Ethics Committee shall present such information to the Board of

Directors, who shall require the candidate to correct the irregularity. If such irregularity is not corrected within 30 days of notification, the Board of Directors shall report such failure to the Ethics Committee for appropriate action.

- F. Members doing IAAO business, such as IAAO instructor or committee member assignments, shall not engage in any political activity on behalf of themselves or other IAAO candidates when on an instructing assignment or when representing IAAO.
- **G.** All campaign advertisements appearing in IAAO publications or electronic media shall clearly indicate what person or organization paid for and/or sponsored the advertisements.

Section 7.6. Election.

- A. Balloting may be done by any means that provides for a secret ballot with security, an audit trail, no duplication of votes, and does not disenfranchise voters. The election ballot shall contain a space for the entering of the name of any member not preprinted on the ballot for election to each position on the ballot.
- **B.** The Board of Directors shall contract with an independent tabulating company to count the ballots returned and certify the results of the election. The Board of Directors shall establish and maintain procedural rules for notification of election results.
- **C.** If no candidate receives a plurality vote (i.e., there is a tie vote), the Executive Director shall order a recount of the ballots. If the recount confirms that no candidate received a plurality vote, the President shall call a special meeting of the Board of Directors. The names of the candidates shall be drawn by lot by the Executive Director or an appointed substitute and the name drawn shall be declared elected.
- **D.** If the difference in the number of votes received by the two candidates receiving the most votes for the same position or office is less than one percent of the total votes cast for that position or office, the Executive Director shall order a recount of the ballots cast to be made.
- E. Candidates wishing to challenge election results must transmit challenges, in writing, to the Executive Director so that the challenges are received no later than ten working days following the notification of the election results to the candidates. A member who is under challenge shall not be sworn in until resolution of the challenge. A \$500 cashier's or certified check, payable to the Association, shall accompany the written challenge. Any additional costs of recounting the ballots over the \$500 amount shall be assessed against the challenger. If the challenge results in a new winner being declared for the position challenged, all money paid by the challenger shall be refunded.
- F. Any member wishing to file a complaint for any alleged misconduct in the election proceedings shall do so in accordance with the rules and procedures of the Ethics Committee.

ARTICLE 8. OTHER AFFILIATIONS

- <u>Section 8.1.</u> Chapters of the International Association of Assessing Officers may be organized and operated according to procedures established by the Board of Directors.
- <u>Section 8.2.</u> <u>The Appraisal Foundation.</u> The Association shall maintain a sponsor organization relationship with The Appraisal Foundation (TAF).

<u>Section 8.3.</u> Other affiliations shall be as determined by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE 9. COMMITTEES AND TASK FORCES

Section 9.1. Committees.

A. There shall be the following standing committees:

Executive Committee
Ethics Committee
Nominating Committee
Finance Committee

- **B.** The Board of Directors may create one or more additional committees. Each such committee shall have two or more directors, a majority of its membership shall be directors, and all committee members shall serve at the pleasure of the Board of Directors. However, committees appointed by the Board of Directors or otherwise authorized by these Bylaws relating to the election, nomination, qualification, or credentials of directors or other committees involved in the process of electing directors may be composed entirely of non-directors.
- **C.** The Board of Directors shall establish procedural rules for the area of responsibility, organization, and operation of each committee. Unless the appointment by the Board of Directors requires a greater number, a majority of any committee shall constitute a quorum, and a majority of committee members present and voting at a meeting at which a quorum is present is necessary for committee action.
- **D.** To the extent specified by the Board of Directors, a committee may exercise the authority of the Board of Directors; provided, however, a committee may not:
 - 1. Adopt a plan for the distribution of the assets of the Association, or for dissolution;
 - 2. Approve or recommend to members any act the Illinois Act requires to be approved by members, except that committees appointed by the board or otherwise authorized by these Bylaws relating to the election, nomination, qualification, or credentials of directors or other committees involved in the process of electing directors may make recommendations to the members relating to electing directors;
 - **3.** Fill vacancies on the board or on any of its committees;
 - **4.** Elect, appoint or remove any officer or director or member of any committee, or fix the compensation of any member of a committee;
 - 5. Adopt, amend, or repeal the Bylaws or the Articles of Incorporation;
 - **6.** Adopt a plan of merger or adopt a plan of consolidation with another corporation, or authorize the sale, lease, exchange or mortgage of all or substantially all of the property or assets of the corporation; or

- **7.** Amend, alter, repeal or take action inconsistent with any resolution or action of the Board of Directors when the resolution or action of the Board of Directors provides by its terms that it shall not be amended, altered or repealed by action of a committee.
 - <u>Section 9.2.</u> Task Forces. The Board of Directors may establish commissions, advisory boards, task forces and similar bodies (some of which may be labeled as committees, but shall not have the power to exercise the authority of the Board of Directors if they do not meet the requirements of Section 9.1.B) as it shall deem necessary to carry out the Association's programs or to advise the Board of Directors on a particular matter. The Board of Directors shall determine the scope of the task force, its organization, its responsibility, and its specific charge. No task force shall be established with a duration that will extend beyond the end of the fiscal year in which it is established.
 - <u>Section 9.3.</u> Committee and Task Force Members. All members shall be eligible for appointment to committees and task forces. With the exception of the executive committee, each committee that has more than three members shall have at least one Associate Member serving as a member of the committee. All members serving on committees shall have the right to make any motion or to propose any resolution on any matter pertaining to the operation of the Association; to discuss and debate any issue or motion presented to the committee; to cast a vote on such motion, resolution, or proposed action; and to call for a roll call vote on any issue which is called for a vote.
 - <u>Section 9.4.</u> <u>Councils</u>. The Board of Directors may establish councils. The Board of Directors shall determine the scope of the council, its organization, its responsibility, and its specific charge.
 - <u>Section 9.5.</u> Affinity Groups. The Board of Directors may establish affinity groups. An Affinity Group is a voluntary membership group that is based on a shared experience, common goal/purpose, and/or special interest.

ARTICLE 10. MANAGEMENT

Section 10.1. Finances.

- A. The fiscal year for the Association shall begin on January 1 and end on December 31, unless otherwise determined by the Board of Directors.
- **B.** Funds of the Association shall consist of a general operating fund and any other funds provided by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall prescribe rules for the operation and control of the funds of the Association. In addition, the Board of Directors shall establish and maintain procedural rules which shall specify an independent firm as the auditor of the Association funds and fiscal operation and govern the administration of all financial accounts of the Association.
- **C.** The Board of Directors shall specify that two signatures are required on all checks and disbursements drawn on the Association accounts.
- D. All officers, agents, or employees of the Association having the authority to sign checks and disbursements, accept and process monies, and/or transfer monies or funds shall furnish bond and sureties

in such amount as designated by procedural rule. The cost of such bonds shall be paid by the Association funds.

- E. All Association and fund accounts shall be established and maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures. The Board of Directors shall establish and maintain procedural rules for the administration of:
 - 1. An operational fund account which shall include all monies received by the Association, unless such monies are designated for a specific purpose, in which case a special fund account for the designated purpose shall be established;
 - 2. Any retirement fund established for Association employees;
 - **3.** The Barbara Brunner Scholarship fund;
 - 4. The Jeff Hunt, CAE, Memorial Candidates Assistance Trust;
 - 5. The Timothy N. Hagemann Memorial Membership Trust; and
 - **6.** The Paul V. Corusy Memorial Library Trust.
- F. The Board of Directors shall establish and maintain procedural rules for the annual budgeting process and fiscal operations of the Association including, but not limited to, periodic budget reports, handling of budget surpluses or overruns, and reimbursement for travel and expenses.
- **G.** The Board of Directors may arrange for the borrowing of funds on behalf of the Association in instances in which such borrowing is necessary to meet the fiscal operations of the Association. The Board of Directors may also arrange for the borrowing of funds for capital expenditures.
- H. All proposals and recommendations from the Board of Directors, the membership at large, committees, the Executive Director, or any other person or group requiring Board of Directors action must include a financial impact analysis and a statement of conformity with the Strategic Plan of the Association. The Board of Directors shall adopt procedural rules for the format and filing of such statements.

ARTICLE 11. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained the eleventh edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern this association in all cases to which it is applicable and in which it is not inconsistent with these Bylaws and any special rules of order the association may adopt. When a new edition of the parliamentary authority is published, the board may, by majority vote and after ensuring that they have familiarized themselves with the changes in the new version, update the edition reference in the Bylaws. Members shall be notified promptly after the change is made.

ARTICLE 12. DISSOLUTION

No motion regarding the dissolution of the Association shall be in order unless such motion contains the full text of a plan for dissolution and distribution of the assets of the Association in accordance with the IAAO Articles of Incorporation, Bylaws and all applicable statutes. The full text of that plan shall have been sent to

each member of the Board of Directors at least 30 days prior to any vote on such motion and shall have complied with all requirements for membership notice and comment in accordance with these Bylaws.

If the Association is dissolved, its assets will be distributed to properly designated education and/or charitable organizations through a formula established by the Board of Directors for dissolving the organization. In no case shall any assets revert to members or any other person, but shall be used for nonprofit, educational, or charitable purposes.

ARTICLE 13. AMENDMENT

Section 13.1. Proposals.

- A. Amendments may be proposed by the Board of Directors, provided that the full text of the proposed amendment shall be transmitted to the Executive Director and to each member of the Board of Directors at least 30 days prior to the vote. A seventy-five percent of the total Board of Directors members vote shall be required to send proposed bylaws amendments for membership vote.
- B. Amendments may also be proposed by a petition of Regular Members, which must be signed by not less than five percent of the total number of Regular Members at the time of the proposal. Such petition must represent at least five states or provinces, and no state or province may account for more than twenty-five percent of the petitioning members. The petition or resolution shall be placed in the hands of the Executive Director, who shall verify that the amendment is in conformance with this section.

<u>Section 13.2.</u> <u>Voting</u>. The full text of the proposed amendment and the ballot for voting on the amendment shall be sent to all Regular Members no less than 30 days nor more than 60 days prior to the date on which ballots are to be returned. The proposed amendment must be approved by a majority of the Regular Members casting ballots provided that the number of Regular Members casting ballots would constitute a quorum if such action had been taken at a meeting. The results shall be certified by the President at the next Board of Directors meeting.
