The FIG Working Week 2013 turned out to be the biggest FIG Working Week ever if counted by number of participants. More than 2,000 Nigerians and close to 250 International participants from 40 countries attended. The Working Week brought together participants from different cultures, diverse surveying traditions and varying professional experiences and is the global forum for surveyors, practitioners, land professionals and FIG partners. The technical programme comprised of 80 technical sessions, workshops and special forums. The total number of presented papers was almost 200 including peer-review papers. The Working Week was held at the Nicon Luxury Hotel and the International Conference Center which was next door to the hotel. The exhibition took place at both sites and included altogether 32 exhibitors. The social events showed the colourfulness and hospitality of the local host starting from the welcome reception to the FIG Foundation Dinner and the conference dinner which were impressive and lively. Also the many Surveyors Wives gave extra flavour to the Working Week with their fantastic dresses and cheerfulness.

STDM Training of Trainers

Held on 4th - 6th May 2013 in Abuja, Nigeria

Seventeen young land surveyors recently gained hands-on experience in the use and application of Social Tenure Domain Model (STDM) in Abuja, Nigeria, 4-6 May 2013. Directly preceding the International Federation of Surveyors (FIG) Working Week conference, the Training of Trainers (TOTs) was organised by the Global Land Tool Network Secretariat which is hosted by UN-Habitat, International Federation of Surveyors (FIG), FIG Foundation and Young Surveyors Network (YSN).

"The key lesson was that STDM is not just a software but a concept and a way of thinking," a remark from a participant from Nigeria.

The training first allowed participants to appreciate concepts behind STDM, its contribution in addressing key land issues, partnerships behind its development and how land surveyors could work together with the poor. Further, trainers engaged participants as they broke down the element of database management and the software itself- among other facets, how to enter, manipulate and analyse data.

Participants took the opportunity to give their view of the STDM concepts and its accompanying information system and shared how STDM could fit in their own work and country context.

"I will try to contact the Slum Dweller Association to see how my students can contribute to STDM work and participate in enumeration activities," said a participant currently working with a University in Uganda.

In the end, the participants were challenged to redefine their land surveying profession to meet the challenging needs of communities both now and in the future. Organisers expressed confidence in the new breed of STDM champions and future trainers STDM.

"I have a gratifying sense that that these young participants were not merely equipped with this tool but that they sense they are part of something bigger and they have the possibility to contribute," remarked FIG President Teo CheeHai in an interview with GLTN. South East Asia Survey Congress 2013

Held on 18th – 20th June in Manila, Philippines

Manila must have been the proud host to the thousands of surveying and mapping professionals from the ASEAN region and worldwide on June 18-20, 2013 at the Philippine International Convention Center (PICC), Roxas Boulevard, Manila. After all, we have served as the host, for the very first time, to one very significant and very engaging 'geospatial' event. This Congress is indeed a rare opportunity for the geodetic engineers and geomatics practitioners in our country. Kudos to the Steering and Organizing Committee of the NAMRIA and PHILGEGS!

The learning experiences gained in the technical sessions and the presentation of the latest technological trends in the surveying, mapping, and geomatics industries were overwhelming and had served as a wakeup call. We have seen that our technology may not be at par with other Asian countries, yet our perseverance and skills would always enable us to integrate all means in acquiring spatial information so that we can measure mountains.

We cannot overemphasize the impact this Congress had on us, however, the wide range of technical sessions and networking had truly allowed each eager participant to increase their awareness in as far as geomatics and geodetic engineers are concerned. In my case, as a young Geodetic Engineer, the Young Surveyors Forum, particularly, comes as a welcome addition to the many learning activities lined up in the Congress. It has actually motivated all the young participants to join and participate in the Forum which gave us the chance to speak our minds.

Indubitably, there is usually a 'stigma' that goes with a joint forum of the young and the 'not so young' attendees. We tend to just yield to the expert and shake off uncertainties on some issues and concerns. If this happens, this is defeating the very purpose of such Forum of becoming a venue in addressing concerns on "geospatial cooperation towards a sustainable future".

A strong Young Surveyors programme will be a key feature of this Congress, with Young Surveyors sessions hosted each afternoon.

The theme, *"Engaging the Challenge, Enhancing the Relevance"* is also the theme of the FIG's current four-year Work Plan.

24th SaGES (Surveying and Geomatics Educators Society)

Held 17 – 21 July 2013, Tyler, Texas (USA)

Hello from Tyler, Texas! Here in Texas that is Hello Y'all! June can be beautiful in central Texas where the Surveying and Geomatics Educators Society (SaGES) recently met. FIG co-sponsored the 24th biennial SaGES colloquium on the beautiful campus of the Tyler Junior College. FIG Commission 2 and the Surveying and Mapping department at Tyler Junior College partnered to host a three-day event which brought together many professors of geospatial higher education programs; including land surveying engineering, GIS, hydrographic surveying and others geomatics specialties.

The professors presented papers on a variety of topics including the current state of the profession, serious issues facing surveying in higher education including bursts of changes in geomatics technology, expanding the program at East Tennessee State, creating a hydrographic surveying program in the United States, and developing collaborative education methods (online classes) for undergraduate Geomatics students. Bigger picture talks included how the land surveying profession is in the midst of a tectonic shift, the future of the profession, and how to successfully sustain a university surveying department during an economic recession. And since we were in Texas, the lectures wouldn't have been complete without several great presentations on surveying in Texas, Spanish land grants, restoring boundaries along the hurricane-hit Texas gulf coast, and surveying Texas water boundaries. Steve Frank, our current chairman of FIG Commission 2, graciously offered to allow me to speak to the SaGES group about the FIG Young Surveyors program. Although Young Surveyors is rapidly growing, our membership in the United States is still relatively low. This forum allowed me to introduce Young Surveyors to many leaders in higher education who also serve as advisors to university student chapters of the national organization in the U.S., National Society of Professional Surveyors (NSPS), and these leaders could be our persuasive advocates in growing Young Surveyors membership.

My presentation included the mission and vision of the Young Surveyors, upcoming conferences and events, the ways professors in the U.S. can help recruit new members and an outline of our success to date.

Although membership in NSPS student chapters is not unusually high, a core group of university students enrolled in surveying programs in the U.S. attend monthly meetings, generate revenue for their local groups through fund raisers and compete in an annual national competition hosted by NSPS. Since NSPS student members have already demonstrated their commitment to participating in our professional group at the local and nation level, these members would be ideal to recruit into the Young Surveyors. The SaGES members can educate students about Young Surveyors and pump-up our membership. After my presentation, many in the audience were enthusiastic to learn more about the FIG Young Surveyors program, how we operate and what they could do to help raise enrolment. Literature was available to everyone and both John Hohol and I are positive about the prospects of gaining new members of Young Surveyors.

Fun social events, before and after the day's presentations, supplemented the three-day agenda. Breakfast and snacks throughout the colloquium allowed old friends to catch-up as well as newer members of FIG to introduce themselves and meet liked-minded people. The highlight of the week was a special dinner at a beautiful local mansion where the Tyler Junior College student band played some great tunes, everyone got to tell their favourite stories since the last SaGES meeting in 2011, and a delicious three-course dinner was served.

Overall, everyone in attendance left with new perspectives about the profession, excitement about the new developments in higher education and a sense of purpose.

The first presentation entitled, 3D Modelling, was delivered by Chris Tanner. The main three ambitions of the meeting can be summarized as followed:


- To provide a voice for Young Surveyors in Europe

2nd Seminar of Albanian nationwide geodetic association – Karl Gega

Held on 27th – 28th April 2013 in Struga, Macedonia

On 27-28 of April 2013 in the beautiful city of Struga - Macedonia was held the second seminar of Albanian nationwide geodetic association - Karl Gega with title "Challenges of Albanian nationwide geodesy", followed by professional workshops for young surveyors about using the new technology (hardware and software applications) in different geodetic works.

In this seminar were present more than 50 participants from different fields like professors, experts in surveying field, a big number of young surveyors and students from Macedonia, Kosovo, Albania, Montenegro and other European countries.

He was followed by the mayor of the city of Struga Mr. Zijadin Sela, rector of the State University of Tetova Mr. Vullnet Ameti, president of the Albanian National Association PhD. Bashkim Idrizi and also this seminar was honoured with the speech of his Excellency the Ambassador of Austria Mr. Thomas Michael Baier who's speech was about the life and work of genius engineer Carl Ritter von Ghega who's name holds the Albanian National Geodetic Association.

Some of the topics which were elaborated during the seminar were:

- Automated geodetic monitoring of dams in Kosovo;
- Calculation and accurate valuation with different software for computing the volume of different objects;
- Geodetic monitoring of mount façades on skyscrapers (practice from work in Sweden);
- Theoretical - practical aspects of establishing of SDI etc.
